

Springtime is upon us! When all the life around us begins to blossom again and come out of hibernation to begin a new year and to start new families. Did you know: To the ancients April was originally the 1st month of the year due to that being when life returns to the land. Then in 45 B.C. Julius Caesar ordered a calendar consisting of twelve months based on a solar year. This calendar employed a cycle of three years of 365 days, followed by a year of 366 days (leap year) making April the second month in Roman time keeping. Finally, The Gregorian calendar was instituted by papal bull Inter gravissimas dated 24 February, 1582 by Pope Gregory XIII, after whom the calendar is named. The motivation for the adjustment was to bring the date for the celebration of Easter to the time of year in which it was celebrated when it was introduced by the early Church. Using January as the 1st month of the year, and to this day we still use the Gregorian calendar.





Spotlight Mason of the Month Brother Dean Fairbanks

What induced you to become a Mason?

Even though my father, a grandfather and a great uncle were Masons it was never discussed. Although I remember several Shriner breakfast events and going to the Shrine auditorium in Los Angeles for the Shrine circus a young kid. The Shrine circus was a magical event for a kid like me from a small agricultural town. I was always interested in deep esoteric literature since college and so it was a natural progression until I asked to be a

member in January 2015. When I told my father, he was happy for me as he knew one has to ask and do it for oneself. I was really happy to tell him I made master mason just a couple of months before his untimely passing.

What do you do for a living?

My wife and I moved to Chico in January 2003, as I had been hired as an assistant professor in the Dept. of Geography and Planning at Chico State Univ. Previous to this job I had been living and working in South Africa for nearly 10 years. Time has moved right along as now I have been at Chico State for 20 years this year and made full professor and served six years as dept. chair. I really like the students, my colleagues, and the interesting research projects I have been pleased to be apart of to help the Sacramento Valley region.

What do you do for your community?

I have been involved in my children's charter schools (parent board member), the local chapter of the Westin

Price Foundation for traditional nutrition and sustainable agriculture, and I was a board member for the Biodynamic Agricultural Association of Northern California. As I stated above, all my research projects now involve regional topics: agricultural water resources, land use management and food systems. I really try to stay informed on local/regional issues and help where I can.

How do you occupy your free time?

Ah, well raising two children has been very busy—free time? Hahaha. Joking aside, I have always enjoyed cooking, reading (lots!), fly fishing, camping, gardening, lots of travel, and general construction on anything. I really like working with my hands. My father was a plumbing contractor so I learned at an early age to get dirty and get to it. Here's a little secret little know of me, I was a journeyman plumber until I left my fathers business at 21.... But please ask brother Dan Heal for plumbing advice, not me! Hahaha.

What do you do for your local lodge?

I have really enjoyed some of the latitude our lodge has afforded me to help us get engaged outside and inside the lodge. I also was grateful to sit on the CMFC board for a three-year stint as secretary. A little history from the Worshipful Master:

Hermes Trismegistus, also spelled Hermes Trismegistos, the Greek name applied to the Egyptian god Thoth as the reputed author or source of the Hermetic writings, works of revelation on occult subjects and theology. The word Occult has been given a bad name by those who do not understand what it really means, it simply means "hidden knowledge" of both the seen (physical laws) and unseen (spiritual/moral laws). The Knowledge contained within the occult sciences can be used for GOOD (the upliftment of human consciousness) or EVIL (manipulation and control). Which is why we must always make sure to use our knowledge of ancient wisdoms to do GOOD and uplift our fellow creatures.

Thoth was the scribe of the gods, the inventor of writing, and the patron of all the arts dependent on writing, including medicine, astronomy, and magic. At least as early as Herodotus, Greeks had identified him with their god Hermes, and by the 3rd century BCE the identification was official. On the Rosetta Stone (196 BCE) Hermes "the great, the great" is evidently Thoth. The epithet Trismegistus (Greek: "thrice-greatest") occurs only rarely outside the Hermetic texts. It represents a development from the Egyptian *aa aa* ("great, great"; that is, "greatest"), which is found as an epithet of Thoth in late hieroglyphics.

The writings ascribed to Hermes-Thoth fall into two main classes: "popular" Hermetism dealt with astrology and the other occult sciences, and "learned" Hermetism concerned itself with theology and philosophy. From the Renaissance until the end of the 19th century little attention was paid to the popular Hermetic literature. More recent study has shown that its development preceded that of the learned Hermetism and that it reflects ideas and beliefs that were widely held in the early Roman Empire and are therefore significant for the religious and intellectual history of the time.
