Thanks for the Shelves; Parking Lot to be Resealed and Striped

A donor who wishes to remain anonymous has purchased three strong metal shelves for the Chico Masonic Family Center garage, which will help tremendously for storing items. The CMFC greatly appreciates the donor's generosity.

Holes at two storm drains have been repaired in the front and back parking lots. The repair required cutting into and excavating the asphalt to create a two-foot-wide concrete perimeter around the drains to prevent the sinking of surrounding asphalt. We thank brother Levy Magneson who did the work at a reasonable fee.

This fall the parking areas around the hall will be resealed and parking spaces restriped. This will not only protect the parking lot from water intrusion but will greatly enhance the appearance and make parking easier with bright white striping.

We expect to eventually get new neighbors to the west and north, now that the home and walnut orchard of our late brother Michael Caprealian has sold. Michael was a Master mason for more than 50 years and a fantastic neighbor. A 75-home subdivision is being planned for this property.

On Saturday, Sept. 9 a successful yard work party was held to prune and remove tree limbs. A scissor lift was rented to reach high limbs impeding garbage trucks and blocking parking lot lights. Low tree branches over parking spots were also trimmed. Thanks to a strong turnout of brothers a lot was accomplished.
